OSU awarded NIH funding to address disparities in COVID-19 testing among vulnerable populations

The OSU College of Medicine has received a \$5 million, two-year award from the NIH to support projects designed to rapidly implement COVID-19 testing strategies in populations disproportionately affected by the pandemic. Ohio State is among 32 institutions to receive awards to help African Americans, American Indians/Alaskan Natives, Latinos/Latinas, Native Hawaiians, older adults, pregnant women and those who are homeless or incarcerated.

Ohio State to begin processing COVID-19 tests on campus



The Ohio State University this fall will begin operating its own laboratory to process COVID-19 tests taken by asymptomatic students, faculty and staff on campus, a move that will likely save the university millions of dollars and make test results more quickly available.
