Restrictions imposed by COVID-19 couldn't stop Jonathan Seok from finding a research opportunity during the summer of 2020. Seok became an integral member of an interdisciplinary research team studying attitudes of health professions students related to depression and anxiety, including questions related to anxiety around COVID.

Flu shots and the potential twindemic

Understanding the risk of two simultaneous health issues, experts are now urging people to get their flu shots. Dr. Richard Watkins, an infectious disease physician in Akron, Ohio, and a professor of internal medicine at Northeast Ohio Medical University said that it is important now to take flu vaccine because "the last thing they need is to get COVID-19 and the flu."
